







Venue Report #67 Monday, October 6, 2008

This was only our second time presenting to SBE Chapter 112 and the folks of Western



Wisconsin area. Our presentation took place in a very interesting building with a lot of history behind it, but how is the home of many different businesses, including the studios of Community Television for the Eau Claire area. The building was once the Uniroyal tire manufacturing plant. The studios of Community Television are nestled in a very small part of this huge building complex on the fourth floor of one of the many. A proper description of this building complex

would take pages. All I can say is: Thank God for a very large freight elevator.

Western Wisconsin (La Crosse – Eau Claire) is the nation's 127th largest television market and serves some 215,610 households. I was told that the turnout of twenty-one we had on the sign in sheet was more than what is typical for SBE Chapter 112. With twenty-one on the official SBE roster, I'd say that's darn good and I truly appreciate it. This is five more than we had the first time the Road Show came to you folks on Monday, October 3, 2005.

I'm grateful that many told me the enjoyed what I did the first time I was there is why they returned for this year's event. I truly appreciate them having me back and on behalf of Shawn Wixted, my assistant and I, we appreciate their most gracious hospitality.

A big vote of gratitude goes to Dick Purves, Operations Manager for Community TV for providing the location and also for playing pizza chef once again. I was more than happy to cover the cost of the refreshments and it appeared that everyone got their full. One more thanks goes to Dick Purves who stayed after everyone else was long gone to help Shawn and I get things packed up so we could make the trek to the Twin Cities that night.

I'd also like to thank Kintner, CPBE/CBNT, SBE board member for stopping by to say hi to us all. Keith has been a dedicated SBE member for many years having served on the board a number of times.

As I recall, we did have two gentlemen who arrived as we were in last throws of setting up, but didn't stay very long, who said they were the local reps for Digi-Data. Since they didn't sign in on the sign in sheet or put cards in the jar, I don't know who they were.

The group was very interactive. One bragged about his station having a Leader Instruments LV5800 and was very pleased with it and the prospects of the new options now available.

Another present was very complementary about his station's Omneon Spectrum video server, saying that he doesn't recall ever having a problem with it and was glad his station had it as it would probably never have to be replace, just parts of it up graded as their needs demanded. He cited its modular construction as the reason.

There was much interest in the Blackmagic 72x144 routing switcher and the capture devices. Most expressed amazement in the compact size of this router and the density of the technology. Several wanted to know when the Blackmagic capture devices would be available. I told them I'd get back to them on that.

Plura monitors only joined us two months ago in North Haven, CT with a 17 inch monitor and more recently with a 37 inch monitor. The interest in these American manufactured monitors has been nothing but intense. That interest was reaffirmed here in Eau Claire as well by most all of the television engineer present.

There was quite a bit of interest in the Telecast Rattlers as well. I was able to answer all the question that came up and I believe at least one of the several stations represented will have them in their next budget.

One of the television stations spoke up about how please they were with their IO HD from AJA. They said they used it not only for editing, but also as an anything in – anything out converter box. They were also interested in the firmware up grades that are now available.
