Venue Report #71 Monday, October 15, 2008

This was my sixth time bringing the Taste of NAB Road Show to the fine folks in the Tulsa area, SBE Chapter 56 and my second time to be hosted in the KWHB-TV CH 47 studios. Tulsa is the nation's 61st largest television market serving well over half a million households.

There are forty-eight members listed on the official SBE roster. This chapter covers quite a large area with members living not only in Oklahoma, but also in Arkansas, where is no SBE chapter, and in Missouri. The list even shows members from Texas and Indiana. We had nineteen folks in attendance. Nineteen is a far cry from the largest attendance we had in 2004 of thirty-eight. I can't believe there were so many other pressing issues that prevented more from attending, but I am grateful to those who did show up. In truth, I'd rather have a small, but active group like we had in Tulsa, than a large, near somnolent bunch, void of signs of life. I truly enjoyed the interactivity we had. Did I say interactive, these guys had something to contribute with each of the twenty-two sponsors as they were presented. I've not had that much contribution at any of the venues this year to date. It started with AJA when one of the stations represented said they had sixteen FS-1s in use and spoke about nearly all the various functions they used them for. This was followed by the PBS folks bragging about their new Axcera transmitter that was being installed. They took particular interest in the slides about Mt. Wilson in our power point presentation.

The next sponsor to boast about the technology we had with us was the station that said they had a very old ComPix Media graphics device in use. They asked about up grading it. I told them who to contact. One of the stations said that they used nothing but BlackMagic devices where ever they could as they felt they were very reliable. They were quite interested in the new developments and the 3 Gbt capacity of the newer BlackMagic equipment.

Nearly every one present show a great deal of interest in the JVC HD250 camera we have with us. I am very glad that Keith Tomiser of JVC was there to help in fielding the question. I fielded a number of questions about the Nverzion automation system. Nearly everyone took CDs on this technology.

There was a great deal of interest in the Plura monitors seemingly limitless features, functions and benefits that it brings to its users the come standard in each model. We used both the JVC camera and the Omneon servers to demonstrate the quality of the pictures that can be displayed which of those technologies generating even further interest in not only the camera, but the features, functions and benefits of the MediaDeck from Omneon server. All of these technologies really compliment themselves and show each other off quite well.

The other technology that really took the spotlight as well was the Telecast Fiber equipment. One groups present bragged about their Teleport system that they use quite often. The Rattlers made a big hit as did the Copperhead.
